Partnership

Bringing university resources to bear on improving teaching in public schools

Content Knowledge

Strengthen Your Teaching with Fellow NHPS Teachers in Seminars Led by Yale Faculty



Established in 1978, the Yale-New Haven Teachers Institute provides content-based professional development for K-12 teachers in New Haven Public Schools. The Institute offers seminars in both the humanities and STEM. They are led by tenured Yale faculty and meet weekly from May to July. Each Fellow must write a curriculum unit on a topic related to their seminar based on their own research using the University's resources. Their completed curriculum unit is then taught in their classroom the following school year.

Institute Fellows:

- receive a Yale ID card, library privileges, and campus access
- increase content knowledge in collegial seminars led by Yale faculty
- create curricula for their students aligned to district standards
- enhance their sense of professionalism and enthusiasm for teaching
- have their curriculum units published on our website
- receive a \$3,000 stipend (\$500 paid in April and \$2,500 upon completion)

All K-12 New Haven Public Schools teachers of English, History, Languages, Arts, Science, and Mathematics who can teach their curriculum unit the following school year are eligible to participate. Fellows are selected based on their eligibility and the relevance of their proposed curriculum unit topic to a seminar and their teaching assignment for the following year.
